Social Studies 2

- Content—Aspects of life shared by and common to peoples and cultures

Social Studies 6

- Big Ideas—Economic self-interest can be a significant cause of conflict among peoples and governments; complex global problems require international cooperation to make difficult choices for the future; systems of government vary in their respect for human rights and freedoms; media sources can both positively and negatively affect our understanding of important events and issues
- Content—roles of individuals, government organizations, and NGOs; international cooperation

Social Studies 7

- Big Ideas—Geographic conditions shaped the emergence of civilizations; religious and cultural practices endure and continue to influence people; increasingly complex societies required new systems of laws and government
- Content—anthropological origins of humans; human responses to particular geographic challenges and opportunities; features and characteristics of civilizations that lead to their rise and fall; origins, core beliefs, narratives, practices and influences of ancient religions; interactions and exchanges between past civilizations and cultures; social and governmental systems and structures in the ancient world

Social Studies 11

- Big Ideas—Understanding the diversity and complexity of cultural expressions in one culture enhances our understanding of other cultures (from Comparative Cultures 12)
- Content—Sacred texts, traditions, and narratives of cultures (from Comparative World Religions 12)

Social Studies 12

- Big Ideas--Interactions between belief systems, social organization, and languages influence artistic expressions of culture; interactions between belief systems, social organization, and languages influence artistic expressions of culture; value systems and belief systems shape the structures of power and authority within a culture
- Content—definitions of culture and how these have changed over time; elements of culture and cultural expressions; systems of power, authority and governance; role of value systems and belief systems in the development of cultures
